Course Description - 1 credit:

This course is an online forum where students will be required to read and comment on the primary literature in the **field of environmental microbiology**. Here, we will discuss the interactions between microbes and their surrounding environment to more fully understand the impact of microbes on ecosystem functioning and health.

Course Learning Objectives:

The objectives of this Journal Club are to: 1) enhance graduate students' understanding of the current state of knowledge regarding the field of environmental microbiology; 2) provide experience in reviewing and critiquing research articles; and 3) build scientific inquiry and written skill sets.

Course Schedule: (Approximate - please follow dates in the Canvas course page)

Week 1&2: Learn about the course structure and tutorial to the Perusal reading tool.

Week 3 - end: Read an assigned primary literature or review article and comment on the paper and discuss the strengths and weaknesses of the paper with your classmates in Perusal.

No Required or Recommended Textbooks:

No texts are required as you will be reading assigned primary literature and review articles.

Rubric for discussion posts on the literature review each week:

The rubric for each week will be as described below.

1. You will receive points for opening (10%), reading the entire paper (10%) and being actively engaged with other students (20%).
2. Most of your score (60%) will be based on the quantity and quality of your posts on the document. The quality of the posts will also be considered, and emphasis will be given for analytical posts (e.g., are you evaluating strengths and weaknesses of the paper?).

Bye Week:

I realize that life can be complicated and get very busy; therefore, each of you will be allowed to skip one week of the course. The gradebook in Canvas will automatically delete your lowest score in the course at the end of the semester, so there is no need to tell me when you plan to skip a week.
